With the increasing demand for various competitive exams, university libraries have emerged as essential hubs for providing relevant study materials, resources, and support to students and individuals aspiring to excel in these exams. This study delves into the strategies, resources, and services offered by university libraries in Telangana to facilitate effective preparation for competitive examinations. Through a comprehensive review of literature, analysis of library services, and user surveys, the study aims to shed light on the significance of these libraries in shaping the academic and professional futures of users. The findings are expected to contribute to the understanding of the multifaceted role of university libraries in supporting education and career aspirations, particularly in the context of competitive exams in Telangana.

Introduction

They are typically designed to be challenging, and the scores obtained on these exams are used to rank the individuals who take them and to determine their eligibility for certain opportunities. Libraries can play an important role in helping individuals prepare for competitive exams by providing access to materials and resources that can help them succeed.

University libraries play a vital role in providing materials for competitive examinations by offering a variety of resources, including books, journals, online databases, and study guides, to help students prepare for exams. The libraries often have specialized collections and reference materials specific to the subjects covered in competitive exams. - Offering training and support to help students effectively use the resources, such as workshops, online tutorials, and one-on-one assistance.
- Encouraging students to take advantage of the resources by highlighting success stories of students who have used them to achieve their goals.
- Making the resources accessible and easy to use by providing them in a variety of formats, including online and in-person.

All India level most popular competitive exams:

- Civil Services Exam (UPSC): This exam is conducted by the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) and is used to select candidates for various civil service positions in the Indian government, such as the Indian Administrative Service (IAS), Indian Police Service (IPS), and Indian Foreign Service (IFS).
- Banking Exams (IBPS, SBI, RBI): These exams are conducted by various banking institutions and are used to select candidates for various positions in the banking sector, such as Probationary Officer (PO), Clerk, and Specialist Officer (SO).
- Railways Exam (RRB): This exam is conducted by the Railway Recruitment Board (RRB) and is used to select candidates for various positions in the Indian railways, such as Junior Engineer, Ticket Collector, and others.
- Engineering Services Exam (ESE): This exam is conducted by the UPSC and is used to select candidates for various engineering positions in the Indian government.
- Medical Entrance Exams (NEET, AIIMS MBBS): These exams are used to select candidates for admission to medical colleges and to determine their eligibility for various medical programs.

Telangana State level competitive exams are a popular way for individuals to secure government jobs and advance their careers. Some of the competitive exams that are commonly taken in Telangana include:

- Telangana State Public Service Commission (TSPSC) Exams: This exam is conducted by the Telangana State Public Service Commission and is used to select candidates for various government positions, such as Group I, Group II, Group III, and Group IV services.
- Telangana State Level Police Recruitment Board (TSLPRB) Exams: This exam is conducted by the Telangana State Level Police Recruitment Board and is used to



select candidates for various police positions, such as Sub Inspector (SI), Constable, and others.

- Telangana State Educational Common Entrance Test (TS EdCET): This exam is conducted by the Telangana State Council of Higher Education and is used to select candidates for admission to B.Ed courses in Telangana.
- Telangana State Engineering, Agriculture and Medical Common Entrance Test (TS EAMCET): This exam is conducted by the Jawaharlal Nehru Technological University Hyderabad and is used to determine eligibility for admission to engineering, agriculture, and medical colleges in Telangana.

Utilizing their expertise in knowledge organization and dissemination, librarians have the potential to make a lasting impact by motivating and aiding young individuals in pursuing their passions and aspirations. This role becomes particularly significant in developing nations like India, where college librarians can actively contribute to the career advancement of youth who seek guidance and support within the library premises, aiding them in their studies and preparation for forthcoming career prospects. Within this context, university libraries are fulfilling a crucial role by furnishing resources and materials essential for tackling competitive examinations. These resources encompass a wide array, including books, practice assessments, and supplementary study aids.

Review of literature

Moly, T.M. (2007) In today's society, a young individual needs not only academic qualifications but also essential skills like effective communication, interpersonal abilities, and future-oriented thinking. Career planning equips students with the tools to make informed career choices, acquire necessary skills, and manage their chosen path. This study underscores libraries' pivotal role in delivering career information services to college students, exploring diverse methods for information dissemination. Emphasis is placed on the significance of offering internet services to aspiring career professionals. The paper identifies challenges faced by libraries in providing high-quality career information services and proposes solutions to enhance these services. Prakashe, Veena & Lengure, Ramanik S. (2016) The study titled "Arts Colleges Library and Competitive Exams: Information Needs and Library Services in Nagpur City" focuses on the information requirements of competitive exam aspirants within Nagpur City's Arts colleges. It evaluates the extent to which college libraries have effectively addressed these needs. The survey conducted at selected libraries reveals crucial insights that can guide future collection development efforts. Key student queries during competitive exam preparation were utilized as indicators to assess library collections and services. The authors conclude by offering suggestions to enhance librarians' ability to better serve these users. Thangaiah, Raja & Kennedy, Ravi Kumar (2017) In the recent years, public libraries are dissemination of resources to the students, Job seekers and the public. Paper discusses the awareness and usage of resources among students and job seekers in public libraries and also paper finds ou the 61.1 percent of the respondents are using the competitive examination resources, 40 percent of the respondents have attended the number of coaching programmes, seminars and model tests related to competitive



examinations, 45.6 percent of the respondents have sufficient level of competitive examinations resources available in the library, 47.8 percent of the respondents are benefitted with the availability of internet with printout facility in the library while applying for the competitive examinations. Farsana, A.K. & Devi B, Mini (2020) conducted a study titled "Information Needs of LIS Career Seekers in Kerala: An Investigative Study." They explored the library's role among career seekers and their requirements for resources and services. The study targeted Mlisc students, part-time librarians, alumni of the LIS department, and fulltime research scholars from University of Kerala and Mahatma Gandhi University. The survey utilized a structured questionnaire with both closed-ended and open-ended questions, distributed among 160 participants, yielding 154 responses. Notably, 99.35% of respondents expressed a need for internet services and electronic resources, while 86.36% sought documents containing application form formats. The study identified a significant demand (98.05%) for materials aiding LIS career seekers and providing information on training and education opportunities. Iroaganachi, Mercy Ariomerebi (2022) in his paper "Competitive Intelligence and Improving Patronage of the Twenty First Century Academic Libraries in Nigeria" discussed the employment of competitive intelligence for improving patronage of the 21st century academic libraries. It explored literature on; the concept of competitive intelligence, characteristics of the twenty first century academic library, attributes of competitive advantage in academic libraries and competitive intelligence activities in Nigerian academic libraries. It was discovered that funds and the necessary skill-sets were required for an academic library to develop to the point of having a competitive edge over other libraries. Also literature revealed that only few libraries especially private university libraries were already treading the path of gaining the competitive advantage for attracting increased patronage. The paper concluded that having competitive advantage is a function of better application of knowledge gained through competitive intelligence as a major factor for staying relevant and be able to attract the 21st century academic sophisticated library clientele. Also adequate provision of funds for innovation and upscale facilities and services is key to attracting patrons.

Objectives of the study

- 1. To know the availability of competitive examination materials in selected University Libraries in Telangana;
- 2. To find out innovative service /best practices adopted by the libraries in providing career guidance services.
- 3. To find out the level of usage of the competitive examination resources in selected University Libraries in Telangana;
- 4. To find out the level of satisfaction about competitive examinations resources in selected University Libraries in Telangana;
- 5. To find out the problems faced by respondents in using competitive examination resources.

Scope and limitation of the study

At present, Telangana State hosts fourteen State Universities and three Central Universities. For this research, specific State University Libraries have been chosen as data collection points due to their conventional nature, well-established status, and extensive collection of competitive materials. The study is confined to collecting usage data solely from students (both PG students and Research Scholars) and Librarians. It encompasses gathering general information about respondents, library resources (competitive materials), and user services. The study is conducted across the following Telangana universities. The following universities of Telangana are considered for the conduct of the study.

The study will utilize a survey approach encompassing all seven university libraries in Telangana to gather data. A semi-structured questionnaire will be employed for data collection, supplemented by observation and interview techniques. The researcher will directly engage with librarians and users to conduct interviews and obtain necessary information. The researcher will personally observe conditions within the chosen Telangana university libraries to ensure validity. The collected data will undergo analysis and will be presented in a tabular format.
