The findings indicated that tourism not only provides funding for businesses but also boosts local firms' productivity and generates employment, ultimately enhancing national welfare.

Sharma & Sharma (2017) examine India's rich history of travel writing, drawing parallels between ancient travelogues and modern travel blogs. They argue that leveraging national heritage sites can promote sustainable development, benefit local communities, and generate tourism revenue for the government. Using questionnaire responses from local stakeholders and focusing on historically significant locations, the study emphasizes the critical role of local populations in the success of heritage tourism.

Kubickova (2019) investigates the government's role in destination tourism, a subset of heritage tourism. The study, focusing on seven Central American countries and analyzing 18 years of data, examines how government policies influence destination competitiveness. The findings suggest that government policies do not always have a positive impact. Some policies had little to no impact, and surprisingly, increased corruption was associated with a boost in destination competitiveness, while tax reductions did not show noticeable results.

Patil and Choubey's (2019) research paper examined Goa's tourism, analyzing the geographical features, tourist population concentration, location, and seasonal variation. The findings suggest that tourism development has led to social and medical problems, while the government has taken steps to enhance tourist facilities and citizens' travel opportunities, leading to increased domestic and foreign tourists and development of historical and pilgrimage sites.
