

SOCIAL WORK AND POLITICAL EMPOWERMENT OF MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES

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Abstract

Marginalized communities continue to experience systemic exclusion from social, economic, political, and cultural opportunities despite significant advances in democratic governance and human rights. Groups such as women, Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, ethnic minorities, persons with disabilities, older adults, migrants, and economically disadvantaged populations often face unequal access to education, healthcare, employment, justice, and political representation. These inequalities undermine democratic development and limit the capacity of societies to achieve inclusive and sustainable growth.
